Alum records message for virtual Veterans Day remembrance

While many area schools are off for Veterans Day, November 11, Mundelein High School has been having school that day and hosting a Veterans Day ceremony for the whole student body. In years past, well over 150 veterans and their families were invited to be honored at the event and were also served both breakfast and lunch during the day. This year, however, turned out to be much different!

The Veterans Day ceremony this year highlighted the current situation with the world-wide pandemic. But MHS was still able to host a virtual Veterans Day event. All students are enrolled in an English class and so those classes took part in a virtual remembrance of the solemn holiday. Guest speaker for the event was Zaneta Stinson Adams, MHS Class of 1995 and a 2017 MHS Distinguished Alumni honoree.

Adams, currently serving as the Director of the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency, a cabinet position in the Michigan

Governor's administration, previously worked as an Attorney At Law, Williams Hughes PLLC. She served in the armed forces and was severely injured while preparing to go to Iraq for Operation Iraqi Freedom. She was told she would never walk again, but her grit and determination led her to recovery. Adams is the President/Founder of Women Injured in Combat [WINC] and has many honors including US Army Medals; Global War on Terrorism, US Army Reserve Warrior Citizen Award; Law School Great Deeds Award; Black Women's Political Caucus Member; Recognized in the Fall 2017 edition of Distinguished Attorneys magazine.

Her message to MHS students was that military service is an honorable career and it provides a number of ways to serve the country and also earn many benefits for education, housing and others. She was grateful to be back "home," although virtually, in Mustang Country. Students gave her a warm "welcome home" reception. The event was organized by Chris Lagioia, social studies/world languages department chair. She was joined by Linda Chapa LaVia, Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs who shared her experiences as well.



Larry Markus, Class of 1967; Associate of Applied Science degree in Mechanical Engineering; Co-owner of Sirius Automation Group, Buffalo Grove, IL; Mentorship with the MHS Robotics Club; Holds a number of patents in Biomedical Engineering/Robotics and

more than 40 years in biomedical engineering, designing instrumentations .

Dr. Max Petersen, Class of 2006; MD, PhD and MPhil degrees from Yale University; BA degree, Augustana College; Completing Internship/Residency in Internal Medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston; Completing a Fellowship in Endocrinology, Diabetes and Metabolism at Washington University School of Medicine; Earned an MD/PhD Thesis Prize from Yale School of Medicine in 2018.

Chad Vale, Class of 1974; Joined the US Air Force Strategic Air Command following graduating from MHS. Served as a jet engine mechanic/aircraft electrical repairman. Seriously injured in a motorcycle accident a year and a half later and medically retired from the Air Force. Has made five trips to Washington, DC for House/Armed Service Committee meetings; Received the Gold Star Family's Hero for a Day Award in Peoria; Recognized for accomplishments in the Air Force and his Volunteerism with the Veterans Affairs Department; Elected judge advocate Veteran Assistance Commission at the state level.

Sergeant Richard Witt, Class of 2000; BS degree in Law Enforcement Justice Administration; Western Illinois University (Magna Cum Laude); Mundelein Police Officer since 2006; Held positions as Accident Investigator, Evidence Technician, Alcohol and Gaming Compliance Officer; Bike Officer, DARE Officer, Police Explorer Advisor; Field Training Officer; School Resource Officer. Frank Giannamore, long-time staff member at MHS, has been inducted into the Lake County Sports Hall of Fame. He was previously inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association and Illinois High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame, both in 2005.

After earning his masters degree in education from Northern Illinois University, Giannamore began his teaching career at the former Libertyville-Mundelein High School. When the districts separated, he was part of the first staff at MHS. He would go on to spend 47 years at MHS where he taught PE, driver education, became a counselor at the school and a football and wrestling coach. He also was the advisor for the SADD organization at the high school.

The Illinois State Board of Education recognized Giannamore with a "Those That Excel Award of Merit." Giannamore also served in the Illinois National Guard for eight years.

MHS newspaper staff earns coveted award from Quill and Scroll

The staff of the Mundelein High School student-produced school newspaper, *The Mustang*, has received an International First Place Award from the 2020 Quill & Scroll News Media Evaluation.

Despite ending the year in remote learning and producing two newspaper issues during the COVID-19 pandemic, the staff earned superior ratings in four of the five evaluation categories for general practices, coverage, writing & editing and digital media. The staff received an excellent rating in the fifth category for visuals.

MHS senior Swetha Chandrasekar was recently published in an online Smithsonian publication. She submitted an article as result of

her connection to the Chicago EYES on Cancer program, an NIH-funded cancer research program at the University of Chicago. Her subject was Our Journey to Mastering Mitochondrial DNA. She is deeply invested in molecular research and hopes to pursue biochemistry and public health in college. She aims to one day become an impactful physician scientist.

Three MHS students complete Co-op program; join the company as employees

The Mundelein High School/MacLean-Fogg Co-op program is a partnership between District 120 and the family-owned MacLean-Fogg manufacturing company, headquartered on Allanson Road in Mundelein. The program is limited to 10 new students each year, and requires a two-year commitment beginning in the student's junior year. Students are part-time, paid employees during the two class



periods per school day that they attend manufacturing-related, dualcredit classes and on-the-job training. The program is designed to give students a thorough understanding of the manufacturing environment, dual-credit college level courses specific to the industry, valuable hands-on experience and the possibility of post-graduation employment (including the opportunity to pursue higher education through the employee education program) with MacLean-Fogg. In just its second year, the program is showing a positive return on the investment for both the students and for MacLean-Fogg. Three 2020 MHS graduates, Michael Dodge, Cole Fritz and Michael Such all began their full-time careers with MacLean-Fogg this summer. Fritz officially began his full-time position on July 21. Fritz had originally planned to attend college full-time and work part-time for the company. However, due to the college's decision to move to remote learning, he found it financially advantageous to begin working fulltime now as he continues to pursue his degree online. He said, "Being part of the program made the transition pretty easy. I already knew how things worked, and I was already comfortable with the (MacLean -Fogg) culture and processes".

Dodge began working on August 3 in the tooling area. Like Fritz, Dodge said, "I got a pretty good idea of what it (the tool room) was going to be like when I was in there during the program; so no big surprises. It's what I expected, and I knew I would like it." Dodge said he may take a few courses at CLC for additional certifications or training along the way, but right now his plan is to simply soak up the on-the-job training and knowledge, and look to grow through experience. He says he really likes the hands-on nature of the work. Michael Such's official start date was Monday, August 10. He began working in the forming department, and plans also to take advantage of the employee education program immediately. His long-term goal is to gain practical experience in manufacturing while earning his engineering degree, and to eventually move into an engineering position with MacLean-Fogg.

Staff makes books easily available for students



Although the 2020-2021 school year looks very different from a "normal" school year, the Mundelein High School Media Center staff are offering pick-up locations throughout the Mundelein area to ensure that all students have access to books. Each Thursday, students may now safely and efficiently pick up books from the high school library without entering the building.

"The MHS Library Media Center staff have been working hard to get books to our students," said Rebecca Plaza, Mundelein High School library information specialist.

"We believe there is a book for every student!," she said. She and Instructional Aide Stacey Klemstein delivered the books. Mundelein High School's security staff, under the direction of Cathy Schmidt, assisted in the delivery of the books.

Students can browse the online catalog and fill out a Google Form with their book requests. Currently, there are more than 15,000 books students can choose from. Once students submit their requests the books are located, bagged and tagged with the student's name and ID number. There are eight pick-up locations in the Mundelein area:

Mundelein school districts and park district collaborate to bring new Little Free Libraries to the community

As a part of the Mundelein Reads Together program, librarians from Mundelein school districts 75 and 120 partnered with the Mundelein Park District to bring six new Little Free Libraries to the community. The little libraries resemble small houses with a variety of books inside. The books

are free to the public and may be taken and kept at home. The librarians from each school recently joined together at Gordon Ray Park and Memorial Park to fill the Little Libraries with free, brand new books for readers of all ages.

"These projects have been a great partnership experience both for me and the D75 librarians as well benefiting Mundelein families!," said Rebecca Plaza, Mundelein High School Library Information Specialist.

Unlike other Little Free Libraries that have a "take one, leave one" model, the librarians wanted to get books in the hands of students and families. Each little library has a sign attached that says "The books are yours to keep. No need to return them." The Little Free Libraries are checked regularly and filled with new books.
