So what is the deal with the AVID binder??

The big black binder is an essential part of the AVID program. One of the hallmarks of successful students is the ability to be organized and plan ahead. The AVID binder is the method we use to help students learn organizational tools such as keeping their class papers and notes in order, writing down assignments in their notebook, keeping extra

paper on hand, and always having the school supplies they need. Our goal is that AVID student backpacks do not look like other students, a disorganized mess full of class papers they can never find. AVID binders are graded on Fridays each week. Included in their grade are their

cornell notes and learning logs for the week in each class, their academic planner, the organization of the binder including no loose papers and tabs for each subject, and their pencil pouch with academic supplies. You can get involved by asking your AVID student to see their binder during the week!



College Corner

Seniors can apply to colleges with either early decision, early action, and regular admission. So what does all that mean?

- Early decision: You can apply to only one early decision college. If the college accepts you and offers you enough financial aid, you must go to that college. That's why these plans are referred to as "binding." Although you may apply to additional colleges through the regular admission process, you must withdraw all other applications if you're accepted by this college. If you are not accepted, you will either be rejected or deferred. Rejected applicants may not apply again that year. Deferred applicants will be reconsidered during the regular admission period, and are free to apply to other schools.
- Early Action: Early action is non-binding. This means you are not bound to attend if you are accepted. You may also
 apply early action to multiple colleges. Early action deadlines usually fall at the same time as early decision. The
 obvious advantage of early action over early decision is the opportunity it gives you to apply to, and ultimately
 compare financial aid packages from several schools. Decisions are usually made before January 1st.
- Regular admissions: It's the way that most applicants apply and the deadlines will vary from institution to
 institution. There will be separate financial aid application deadlines and requirements of which you must be aware,
 but in general the process is pretty straightforward.Once you submit an application, you can apply for financial aid by
 completing the FAFSA (and perhaps the CSS Profile). You'll receive a letter of acceptance or denial, and if you're
 accepted, then you will also receive an award letter that details any financial aid you're eligible to receive.You're
 required to make your final college choice by May 1.
