

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



DISTRICT TAX HIGHLIGHTS

- The district's overall tax rate has dropped \$.29 since its 2014 high rate. That's about a 10% reduction in rates.
- MHS's overall tax rate is comparable, lower or much lower than most neighboring Lake County HS districts.
- Over the past five years, an average \$300,000 home in the MHS district saw an increase in the total average tax (that the district receives) of about \$45 per year. As a percentage of the total property tax bill that's an average of .004% increase per year.

SHARED SERVICES/ SHARED SUPERINTENDENT TO BEGIN JULY 1

The shared services model is set to begin on July 1, 2019. With the retirement of District 75 Superintendent Andy Henrikson set for June 30. the boards of education from both Mundelein Elementary District 75 and Mundelein High School District 120 have been working closely together to make a smooth transition to shared services.

For several months, a committee from within these two groups has been working with an educational consultant. Dr. Dale Truding, on a formal outline called the "Declaration for a Shared Service Model for the Superintendent."

"The main purpose for the formal declaration is to create a historical perspective of the process that took place in moving towards this Shared Services/ Shared Superintendent Model," Truding explained.

"This way, future Board of Education members and superintendents will know what led to the arrangement and what it was intended to accomplish," she said.

According to the Declaration, the two Boards of Education will seek to uphold and improve public education for the community that will survive beyond their tenure as board members. Specifically, the Declaration says the two districts will:

Build trust and move the districts forward

Become an effective team with a common, focused direction

Understand our individual roles and collective responsibilities

Nurture our environment that supports positive change

Explore additional shared services opportunities as they arise

I am looking forward to being superintendent for both districts beginning in July. This is a great opportunity for our two districts to work closely together and will also benefit our other feeder districts, 73, 76 and 79, to provide an excellent, cohesive and consistent education for all Mundelein students from Pre-K to high school seniors.

INCREDIBLE REACTIONS TO BOOK MURALS



The viral story on the book murals in the MHS English hallway received record positive responses on several platforms. Coverage of the story took place in the Daily Herald, New Jersey Family magazine, Scary Mommy website, Pop Sugar website, BBC in London, two European countries and countless websites and blogs. Diane Covert, English Department Chair and Ron Girard. MHS Public Information Officer received countless inquiries about the project from teachers and administrators from around the country and across the globe.



In addition, three of the authors of the featured books are making plans to visit MHS and speak with students about their novels. Simon and Schuster, publisher of some of the books plans to donate copies of their published novels to the English Department library.

Completed during the Winter Break, murals of the novel covers were installed from floor to ceiling outside the English classrooms of teachers Ryan Buck, Mike Dayton and Mark Landuyt. The book cover reproductions were selected by these teachers as some of their favorite novels and were of high interest level for students. The project was completed by Visual Image Photography (VIP) which cost about \$400 per book cover.

What happened after the students came back from school break was incredible. The mural images posted on the MHS social media pages (Facebook and Twitter) quickly amassed a record-breaking amount of positive feedback. Within 48 hours. more than 4,000 people had shared the post and early 750 had favorably commented.

"I was amazed at the responses," said Ron Girard, MHS public information officer. "Many comments were from teachers and administrators from all over the country who wanted to replicate the idea."

As the story went viral, Jason Reynolds, author of one of the novels. All American Boys, tweeted his pleasant reaction. In addition, the publisher of two of the books donated 30 copies of each to the English Department. Christopher McDougall, another author, was scheduled to visit MHS and speak with students but his flight was cancelled due to a snowstorm.

Most importantly, the teachers said that the project accomplished exactly what they had hoped—to stir an interest in great literature among students.

SHARK TANK "WINNERS" **GIVE TIPS TO BUSINESS INCUBATOR STUDENTS**

Mundelein High School's Business Incubator students and staff hosted a presentation on March 6, by the inventors of SnapClips, a product they pitched to the entrepreneurs on the TV show, Shark Tank.



At the end of the presentation, three sharks- Mark Cuban, Lori Greiner and Alex Rodriguez made a combined \$150,000 offer for 30% equity in the business and SnapClips accepted.

The duo, Chief Executive Officer Martin Dimitrov and Chief Marketing Officer John Perricone spoke with MHS and Carmel High School Business Incubator students in Mundelein's state-of-theart Business Incubator Laboratory. The audience included the associate principal for curriculum and the Business Incubator teacher from Round Lake High School.

The inventors first started their project while in a Business Incubator course at Wheeling High School They spoke about coming up with their initial idea, how they developed it, and what stages they went through on their way to Shark Tank.

SnapClips, a new design for keeping weights stable during workout sessions, was an instant hit with the Shark Tank business investors.

The event was planned by Rosangela Fiore, MHS community coordinator and Michelle Sherwin-Petrucci, Business Incubator instructor.

SIXTY FOUR SENIORS RECOGNIZED AS ILLINOIS STATE SCHOLARS

Mundelein High School Principal Anthony Kroll has announced that 64 students from the MHS graduating class of 2019 have been recognized as Illinois State Scholars.

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC), the state agency committed to helping to make college accessible and affordable for Illinois families, confers this recognition to top Illinois high school students annually. This year, more than 21,000 honorees join the other top students who have been honored for their academic achievements since the designation was first introduced in 1958.

Illinois State Scholars represent approximately the top ten percent of high school seniors from 757 high schools across the state. Illinois State Scholars are chosen based on a combination of exemplary ACT or SAT test scores and sixth semester class rank.

"We're extremely proud of these students for being recognized as Illinois State Scholars and wish them well in their preparations for the next phase of their lives," Dr. Anthony Kroll, principal, said.

MORA CHOSEN FOR CHINESE IMMERSION SUMMER PROGRAM

Mundelein High School junior, Christopher Mora, has been selected by the Counsel on International Educational Exchange (CIEE) to spend part of the upcoming summer studying Chinese Language and

Culture in Shanghai, China. He was nominated by his Advanced Placement (AP) English teacher, Angie McLaughlin.

"You should be extremely proud of Christopher as we had more than 3,000 applicants for our November 30 deadline," said Anna Johnson, a CIEE representative. "We rely on your recommendations to help us determine which applicants to accept and award scholarships to. Thank you for your time and patience, and for all that you do to support your students' efforts to live and learn abroad!" she said.

Mora is currently carrying a rigorous group of courses which include AP Psychology, AP Spanish Language, AP United States/ Comparative Government and Politics, Honors Pre-Calculus, AP English Language, Honors Physics and PE Strength 2.

"I first heard about the program through the morning announcements at school and thought it would be a great experience," Mora said. "I was thrilled when I found out I was accepted and was basically awarded a 'free ride' scholarship too."

Mora is looking forward to learning Mandarin and hopes to become fluent in the language. His future plans include studying medicine in U.S. communities with Mandarin speaking residents. While in Shanghai, Mora will spend four weeks living with a local family. "That should really help me to understand the culture that I will be living in," he concluded.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses provide students with college level academic experiences. Students have an opportunity to take an AP exam each spring that assesses their learning in their AP courses. Students who receive a passing score on these exams can earn college credit.

Honors courses provide students with rigorous academic experiences that advance their skills and content knowledge in a variety of subject areas. Honors courses are solid preparation for Advanced Placement course work.

Nearly three-quarters of our students participate in 80+ co-curricular activities including 30+ athletic teams and 50+ clubs/activities with focuses in academics, careers, competitions, culture, dance, discussion, health, leadership, media, music, recreation, service, theater, and visual arts.

90 RECEIVED BILINGUAL

Ninety District 120 seniors have earned the State Seal of Biliteracy since its inception in 2016. The State Seal of Biliteracy is a recognition given to graduating high school students who have demonstrated a high level of proficiency in English, and also in reading, writing, listening and speaking in a second language.



Golden Apple, a leading Illinois nonprofit committed to recognizing exemplary educators and developing future educators, surprised Sara Blair Winter-Rosenberg, a Mundelein High School teacher, on March 18 with the highly respected Golden Apple Award for Excellence in Teaching. The annual award, which recognizes and honors outstanding teachers for their role in building a stronger, better-educated society, was presented to her in her classroom in front of students and school leadership.

Following a competitive process, the 2019 award recipients were selected from more than 550 nominations of high school teachers from 71 Illinois counties. The field was narrowed to 32 finalists and from that group, 10 were chosen in Illinois.

Winter-Rosenberg has been teaching at Mundelein High School since 2012 in the World Languages department. She currently teaches Honors Spanish 5, Honors Spanish Heritage Learners 4 and Spanish Heritage Learners 3.

The 2019 award recipients will be featured on a Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) one-hour TV program. The show taping will air on Golden Apple's Facebook page on May 18 and the edited PBS broadcast will air on multiple future dates.

OF ONLY TEN AWARD WINNERS IN ILLINOIS THIS YEAR



the learning of students. An important part of a Fellows' mission is to share his or her expertise and mentor Golden Apple Scholars, who are aspiring teachers with a desire to teach in Illinois' schools-of-need.

OK ESTIMATED PhD SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Born in Mexico City, Araiza Bravo arrived in the U.S. in 2011 when his father, a senior engineer, was transferred to Libertyville. There, Araiza Bravo attended and graduated from MHS. He said it was a challenge but a necessity to learn English immediately. He recalled an incident that he told to The News-Gazette in Champaign-Urbana— "When you can't ask for a doughnut at Dunkin' Donuts, that's when you know you have to learn the language," he said.

After graduating from MHS, Araiza Bravo enrolled in the Engineering Pathways program at the College of Lake County (CLC). He explained that University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign was a perfect fit because of its affordability, proximity to his Chicago-area family and Illinois' reputation in engineering, math and physics.

Besides being an award-winning teaching assistant in the Illinois physics department, Araiza Bravo enjoys bowling and playing soccer. While at Mundelein High School, Araiza Bravo branched out into other areas besides math, earning the lead role of Romeo in the school's production of Romeo and Juliette and winning the title of Mr. Mustang his senior year.

"This is just another example of one of the many young people who use their Mundelein High School education to go out into the world and make a difference," said Kevin Myers, MHS District 120 Superintendent. "We're very proud of Oscar's accomplishments."
